<u>Scriptures:</u> Esther 7: 1-6, 9-10, 9:20-22. Psalm 124. James 5:13-20. Mark 10: 17-31.

God, we remember in our prayers those who work within the church in both our United and Anglican traditions. They guide, teach and inspire us: Last Saturday in Port Alberni, Presbytery lay delegates, ministers and the Comox-Nanaimo Presbytery Executive met. This week, we especially pray for Rev. In the story of Esther, a beautiful and brave woman overcomes her terror of the King of Persia, her husband, and disobeys his orders. In the end, she saves her people, the Jews, from annihilation, as planned by Haman. Last Thursday Dr. Christine Blasey Ford, testified to the Judiciary Committee about her experiences of assault, despite her terror. We prayed for her success. Her bravery paved the way for a change in process and might we wonder, the rejection of someone unfit for the Supreme Court?

In our church, we worry and pray for those who are unwell or unhappy. We also think of Margaret Hesthammer at Dufferin Place, who loves visitors. We trust that the current cold epidemic sweeping our community is over soon.

God, help us to place kindness, gentleness and love in the centre of our lives.
